WEAPONS SAFETY



Greetings fellow HRS Members,

One of the primary responsibilities of the Board is to maintain safety standards for our members and public. As many of you know, earlier this year a reenactor was shot with a live round during a public World War II reenactment battle in Texas.

The circumstances that led to the accident are not fully known, but it did not involve the WW2 HRS. Fortunately the reenactor who was shot survived and will recover.

I did ask our Safety and Authenticity Committee for a prompt an immediate review of our safety procedures, this included a conference call with unit commanders in February as well. The general consensus was that additional layers of safety precautions should be implemented (primarily at major events) to ensure that we are doing everything we can to avoid this sort of accident. An exploratory committee of Unit Commanders, Board Members and Safety and Authenticity Committee members has been created to make recommendations to the HRS board in regard to enhancing safety procedures. Updates on their progress will be coming over the next several months.

The World War II Historical Reenactment Society has done an exceptional job of policing itself, enforcing its own safety regulations and continues today to be a leader in setting the standard for how our hobby manages its unique safety challenges.

I would please ask for your full cooperation in helping us initiate these additional safety standards over the coming months. Event safety starts with each of us individually. Thank you for your time.

WWII HRS Scholarship 2015

In 2010 the membership approved the creation of an HRS scholarship. The effort behind the scholarship was twofold. The primary goal is to assist the younger members of our organization in their pursuit of higher education. Obviously historical reenacting is an expensive hobby that can be a near impossibility for some students. Secondly we will help grow interest in historical reenacting as an educational endeavor which is part of the mission of our Society. The scholarship will be awarded to a full time undergraduate or graduate student. The preferred majors are history, museum studies, or archeology however all HRS member students are encouraged to apply. The award can be used towards tuition or books and will be paid to the student's college or university to be credited to their account. Note that any family or relations of any board of directors or staff of the WWII HRS will be ineligible for this award.

Please send the applications to the WWII HRS Vice President. The amount of the award is \$500.

Eligibility:

 Must be a current member of HRS in good standing in at least their second year of membership.
 Must be registered as a full-time student; undergraduate or graduate; at an accredited college or university.

3. Must demonstrate a minimum GPA of 2.75.
4. Must currently be a history or associated major, however if there is not any history or associated major that apply then all majors are eligible.
5. Must not have received a previous HRS

scholarship.

Requirements:

The student should write a 500-word essay describing their qualifications and justification for receiving the HRS scholarship. It should also include the student's future plans in reenacting. A letter of recommendation from their unit commander should also be included. If the student is the unit commander for their unit, then another commander can supply the letter. Unofficial transcripts or a letter from the student's college or university stating that the student's current major and GPA needs to be included along with a recent picture in WWII uniform of the student.

Deadline: July 1 **Notification**: August 1

An article highlighting the student will be in the Society publication, The Edge, after the scholarship is awarded.

Review:

A committee consisting of an Allied, an Axis, and a Commonwealth member will review and give recommendation to the Society board of directors for awarding the scholarship based on the submitted applications.

Kennekuk WW2 Remembrance Days May 2 and 3rd 2015

On May 1-3 we will kick off the summer WW2HRS reenacting season with the Kennekuk World War 2 Remembrance Days at Kennekuk County park near Danville Illinois. This will be the fifth year for this event. We are hoping public attendance will continue to grow this year. The 2014 attendance was much improved over previous years. It is our goal to make WW2 reenacting better known in an area where it is largely unknown.

Danville is in East Central Illinois, forty minutes from Champaign-Urbana and near the Indiana state line. Kennekuk Park is a 3000 acre park with plenty of open space for encampments and battles. It also features a town display of 10 vintage buildings. On Friday evening we will have a WW2 vehicle convoy that will start at Kennekuk, travel through Danville. We will be having one large field battle each day on Saturday and Sunday. The main field battle will feature Warbird flyovers courtesy of local Warbird owners weather permitting. We are also planning to have a few small unit skirmishes during the weekend. There will also be opportunities for small unit tactical battle in the wooded areas of the park. We will also have USO Shows featuring the USO Camp Show group. On Saturday evening we will have a 1940's Barn Dance at the Red barn at Kennekuk. The dance will be preceded by Swing Dance lessons offered by the ladies of USO Stateside Operations. This event is open to all World War 2 impressions. We would appreciate it if the WW2 reenacting community will add Kennekuk to the events they will be attending this year.

Fort Custer, MI World War 2 Tactical "Delay the Inevitable" 20-22 March 2015



After Action Report: Fort Custer, Michigan By Alan Miltich

This was the tenth annual "Delay the Inevitable" tactical held in March, hosted by "Infamous Alfons" and members of 5thSS "Wiking" Sturmpionier (not to be confused with the Wiking in Colorado). The battle features two nights in the barracks of this small active military base along with a very demanding tactical system called Rules of Engagement for Tactical Objectives (RETO). Maybe it was the cold winter or maybe it was the lower gas prices, but the event had one of the best turnouts since Alfons' inspiration to start hosting events at Fort Custer, just west of Battle Creek.

Over 173 re-enactors and umpires converged on the base to enjoy one of the nicest weather days experienced by Michigan this entire month! The base allowed use of four two-floor barracks and a dining hall. The battle took place in Training Area 5, a one square mile area a little more than three miles from the barracks.

The military now requires that all blank ammo be collected at the gate. The Wiking staff has developed a very efficient method of collecting pre-labeled bags of ammo and magazines to be stored overnight. After turning in the ammo, the re-enactor follows the signs to the dining hall where the registration tables are set up, along with the vendors, the classroom for the RETO rules seminars, and the snack bar operated by the HRS 45thInfantry I&R Platoon. After being assigned to the barracks, the re-enactor is free to unload and mingle. All re-enactors must attend a course on the RETO battle system.

To supplement the battle, various vehicles participated: On the Allied side there were an M20 "Greyhound" and M3 halftrack from the Arsenal of Democracy museum, four Jeeps, and a WC52 weapons carrier. On the Axis side there were the perennial Wiking vehicles of two Kubelwagen and the 1941 V3000 Ford Truck "Heidi", this year bolstered by the wonderful Opel Blitz and 247 armored scout car of 2nd Panzer (Chicago). We were able to transport all the troops out in one convoy.

The few umpires we had to monitor the command posts were volunteers from the Michigan 82nd Airborne Veteran's Association. These veterans really enjoy the weekend with us and are often seen with a display at WWII public events here in Michigan. They come dressed in fairly good Allied and Axis impressions, wearing soft caps to designate a non-combatant role.

After the conclusion of the battle (The Allies were victorious this year!) we concluded with a dinner of grilled chicken breasts and red skin potatoes for 99, followed by a WWII themed trivia contest with prizes for all the teams. As usual, the "Custers First Stand" bar on base was open and welcomes the re-enactors.

For many of the re-enactors, this tactical is a highlight and also marks the beginning of the new season. If the event gets much more popular, we may have trouble fitting everyone into the barracks! The fall "Westwall" tactical is scheduled for October 16-18, so put it on your calendar!

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ITEMS FROM Terry Johns WWII HRS, Founder

In regards to M1 Carbines with bayonet lugs... A correct WWII U.S. M1 Carbine:

Some fifteen years ago I sent a letter to the editor of ARMY MOTORS of the Military Vehicle Preservation Association (MVPA) regarding a M1 Carbine. It was in response to an article someone wrote about their jeep restoration marked for the ETO's 104th Division. In the article the writer described adding a M1 Carbine with bayonet. This carbine had the late war bayonet lug and adjustable sight.

My response revolved around my opinion that no bayonet lugged M1 Carbines ever reached combat units during WWII as I had never once seen one after many decades of looking. I questioned if the bayonet was proper. I ended by challenging the author to provide me with any information that could prove otherwise.

I'll omit his response but suffice that it did not include any documentation to the contrary.

The MVPA editor, Reg Hodgson, later told me that short item generated more responses than any single article in the history of ARMY MOTORS.

When the HRS first formed (1970's) many GIs were cutting off the bayonet lugs (very carefully) and searching vainly (then) for the simple flip sight. Now perhaps my GI friends more knowledgeable regarding the carbine than I ever was, will excuse me if I continue...

Years ago I happened across a bookstore that had one of those large coffee table books about WWII in color. Inside I found a GI wearing HBT holding a M1 Carbine which sported the oddest looking bayonet lug the likes of which I have never seen. It was an extremely flimsy looking device in comparison to the ones we are all familiar with. The caption stated this was a training photo and I would suspect that this bayonet lug was perhaps one of the very first prototype attempts to attach a bayonet to the Carbine.

Soon after that I found another WWII history book with a color photograph of the 17th A.B. Div. following the Rhine River crossing in 1945. This photo showed a wood stocked M1 Carbine lying near a soldier with (clearly) a M1 Carbine Bayonet strapped to his leg. Significantly the Carbine has no bayonet lug!

Years pass ...

During a History Channel program depicting the 45th Div. entry into Dachau, Germany in April 1945; two M1 Carbines were shown, neither if which sported bayonet lugs but both had the late adjustable rear sight.

As Arte Johnson said during the LAUGH-IN TV show, "Very interesting!"

Anyone born in the mid-thirties knew Kilroy. We didn't know why but we had lapel pins with his nose hanging over the label and the top of his face above his nose with his hands hanging over the label too. I believe it was orange colored. No one knew why he was so well known but we all joined in!

KILROY WAS HERE! WHO THE HECK WAS KILROY?

In 1946 the American Transit Association, through its radio program, "Speak to America" sponsored a nationwide contest to find the REAL Kilroy, offering a prize of a real trolley car to the person who could prove himself to be the genuine article. Almost 40 men stepped forward to make that claim, but only **James Kilroy from Halifax , Massachusetts,** had evidence of his identity.

Kilroy was a 46-year old shipyard worker during the war who worked as a checker at the Fore River Shipyard in Quincy. His job was to go around and check on the number of rivets completed. Riveters were on piecework and got paid by the rivet. Kilroy would count a block of rivets and put a check mark in semi-waxed lumber chalk, so the rivets wouldn't be counted twice. When Kilroy would coust off duty, the riveters would erase the mark. Later on, an off-shift inspector would come through and count the rivets a second time, resulting in double pay for the riveters. One day Kilroy's boss called him into his office. The foreman was upset about all the wages being paid to riveters, and asked him to investigate. It was then he realized what had been going on.

The tight spaces he had to crawl in to check the rivets didn't lend themselves to lugging around a paint can and brush, so Kilroy decided to stick with the waxy chalk. He continued to put his checkmark on each job he inspected, but added KILROY WAS HERE in king-sized letters next to the check, and eventually added the sketch of the chap with the long nose peering over the fence and that became part of the Kilroy message.

Once he did that, the riveters stopped trying to wipe away his marks.

Ordinarily the rivets and chalk marks would have been covered up with paint. With war on, however, ships were leaving the Quincy Yard so fast that there wasn't time to paint them. As a result, Kilroy's inspection "trademark" was seen by thousands of servicemen who boarded the troopships the yard produced. His message apparently rang a bell with the servicemen, because they picked it up and spread it all over Europe and the South Pacific. Before war's end, "Kilroy" had been here, there, and everywhere on the long hauls to Berlin and Tokyo.

To the troops outbound in those ships, however, he was a complete mystery; all they knew for sure was that some jerk named Kilroy had "been there first." As a joke, U.S. servicemen began placing the graffiti wherever they landed, claiming it was already there when they arrived.

Kilroy became the U.S. Super-GI who had always "already been" wherever GIs went. It became a challenge to place the logo in the most unlikely places imaginable (it is said to be atop Mt. Everest , the Statue of Liberty, the underside of l'Arc De Triomphe, and even scrawled in the dust on the moon.) As the war went on, the legend grew. Underwater demolition teams routinely sneaked ashore on Japanese-held islands in the Pacific to map the terrain for coming invasions by U.S. troops (and thus, presumably, were the first GI's there). On one occasion, however, they reported seeing enemy troops painting over the Kilroy logo!

In 1945, an outhouse was built for the exclusive use of Roosevelt, Stalin, and Churchill at the Potsdam conference. Its' first occupant was Stalin, who emerged and asked his aide (in Russian), "Who is Kilroy?"

To help prove his authenticity in 1946, James Kilroy brought along officials from the shipyard and some of the riveters. He won the trolley car, which he gave to his nine children as a Christmas gift and set it up as a playhouse in the Kilroy front yard in Halifax, Massachusetts.

So, now you know the rest of the story. I wonder what became of that trolley.



The Vickers Goes Hollywood! By Terry L. Johns, Florissant, MO

Hooray for Hollywood and Vickers, which is credited with helping launch actor David Niven (1910-1983) on his movie career. Niven was a graduate of the Royal Military College at Sandhurst and as a young subaltern; Niven grew tired of the peacetime Army of the early 1930s. As he related in his memoirs, THE MOON'S A BALLOON, his ultimate decision to resign from the army came: After a lengthy lecture on the Vickers machinegun which was interfering with his plans for dinner with a particularly attractive young lady. At the end of the speech, the major general giving the lecture asked if there were any questions. Showing the typical rebelliousness of his early years, Niven stated that he felt compelled to ask, "Could you tell me the time, sir? I have to catch a train."

Years after his encounter with the Vickers as a junior officer in the Highland Light Infantry he would return to England after the start of the Second World War and be reunited with this old acquaintance during the filming of the classic 1944 war film starring himself as Lieutenant Jim Perry in THE WAY AHEAD. The movie had a bit of a convoluted history. It started life as a British Army training film, THE NEW LOT, which ran 44 minutes. Winston Churchill approached then Major Niven about creating a film that would do for the British Army what IN WHICH WE SERVE had done for the Royal Navy. Niven then contacted Carol Reed, the film's director, and suggested expanding THE NEW LOT. The result, written (at London's Ritz Hotel) by Niven, Eric Ambler and twenty-one year old Peter Ustinov, was the acclaimed THE WAY AHEAD. For its U.S. release in 1945, the film was edited to a shorter length and re-titled THE IMMORTAL BATTALION. In either of its feature length forms, the film is concerned with the training of a bunch of raw recruits. Niven, as the lieutenant and former gas station attendant, finds that he must learn to take a tough line in order to make his wildly diverse crew come together and understand the importance both of the war and of their place in it. Although it takes time and effort on the part of Lt. Perry and his sergeant, William Hartnell, the men eventually transform themselves into a fighting unit thus preparing them for their climatic battle against the Desert Fox in North Africa.

Told in a semi-documentary style, it features the screen debut of Trevor Howard as an un-credited naval officer and Sgt. Hartnell who is perhaps best remember for playing the original "The Doctor" on the TV series DOCTOR WHO. Stanley Holloway can also be found in the likes of; THE LAVENDER HILL MOB, MY FAIR LADY and IN HARM'S WAY, plays Private Brewer. James Donald who plays the impressionable Private Lloyd would later appear as the insightful Major Clipton in THE BRIDGE ON THE RIVER KWAI. Leo Genn as the Captain would come our way again, after promotion, in the film THE LONGEST DAY. The Scottish soldier Luke was played by John Laurie, would reappear to us in that British Telly comedy DAD'S ARMY. Also cast is the young Peter Ustinov as the French-speaking proprietor of the Café Rispoli who comes to the rescue of one overheated Vickers by providing some fine vintage Claret. What an ensemble, eh? Indeed, what a legacy! Below are scans of the front and back of the post card. It was a promotional card put out by Wham-O (owned by Mattel) for the Hula Hoop, and I would guess that would make it the 1950s or 1960s. I made the file for the back small to save you download time but I can send that full size if you like. I have seen this photo before with other humorous writing other than Hula Hoop. You might send the photo to someone you know who is an old movie buff and see if you can identify any of the actors. I have done every search I can think of but come up empty.

The US .50 Caliber M2 Browning By Terry L. Johns, Florissant, MO

From its belated start as an antitank gun following the First World War, the M2 just keeps going and going. Today the gun is still in production at the Fabrique Nationale factory in Herstal, Belgium and at General Dynamic's facility located in Saco, Maine. That a weapon conceived during the waning days of the First World War could serve so long and outlive so many other designs is a testament to the genius of John M. Browning, whose other contributions to America's military arsenals included the 1911 series of automatic pistols, and the Browning Automatic-Rifle.

Over 347,000 M2 heavy barrel infantry .50 caliber machineguns were manufactured during World War II and most of these by the AC Spark Plug Company of all folks! I suspect most of this heavy iron was found attached to some sort of motorized conveyance. I would have thought 'Old Bill' had it rough enough lugging that forty pound Vickers about but pity the 'Sad Sack' who had to pound the ground with eighty-two pounds of this hunk of iron on his shoulder! The weight of just the recoiling parts of the gun when it was fired weighed in at more than thirty-eight pounds in of itself. What could I add in praise to the famous "Ma-Deuce"? Instead I would like to cite a quote from Mr. Bruce Canfield's book U.S. INFANTRY WEAPONS OF WORLD WAR II.

"In the Solomons on one occasion the Marines surprised a Jap transport column that appeared to consider itself out of machinegun range and shot it up with .50 caliber Brownings. The heavy slugs smashed up the Jap trucks and made the Jap soldiers who were hit by them look as if they had been run over by the trucks." The fifty is basically an enlarged thirty-caliber Browning machinegun. Enlarged to handle a cartridge capable of penetrating the tanks of the First World War. They accomplished this by starting with the cartridge of the German 13.2 mm antitank rifle of the period. But in a rare case of inspired one-upmanship the Doughboys opted to go for a machinegun rather than just an enlarged bolt-action rifle as the Germans had and the British would later. Both Winchester and then Frankford Arsenal were involved with the development of the big .50 BMG cartridge as we know it today. Both the refined cartridge and the gun began testing in 1919. We might scoff today with the idea of the .50 BMG round penetrating today's tank but even as late as 1939 that big slug in its armor-piercing mode could penetrate most of the world's rolling armor.

Requiem to the Carter Carburetor By Terry L. Johns, Florissant, MO

The Carter Carburetor Company of St. Louis, MO was established in 1909. It was founded by William Carter, who started experimenting with automotive carburetors while running a bicycle shop. He sold his carburetor company 13 years later to American Car and Foundry Company.

Carter adapted carburetors for Willys' four-cylinder engines, waterproofing them for water crossings and making it possible to keep the engine going even on a steep incline. In 1984, with fuel injection having replaced carburetors, the plant closed. In 1985 American Car and Foundry shut down the entire Carter Carburetor foundry, a year later ceding the PCB-contaminated property to the City of St. Louis.

In the 13 February, 2015 issue of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch newspaper, reporter Jacob Barker reported that workers have nearly completed removing asbestos from the vacant factory located on North Grand Boulevard and Dodier Street next to the former site of Sportsman's (baseball) Park. The EPA is overseeing the demolition and cleanup of the site, which is contaminated with cancer causing toxins left over from the carburetor manufacturing process. The St. Charles, MO based American Car and Foundry Industries, LLC, is responsible for much of the \$27 million cleanup project.
