"I don't run from things. A component of German reenactors helped our family out during a difficult time," said Dave. "Following an accident, we were worried about hospital bills. Our friends Pat and Zack told me their unit had pitched in for a gift for my family for Christmas."

Since then, Mikey and **Nicholas** have tested and designed various decorations and equipment using CAD software. They have created flat batteries, grenades, statues, soft knives, and more in time for the 2025 reenacting season. They focused on items that are hard to obtain or known to be expensive, having learned from their father's reenacting experience.



As they found out this May, their flat batteries were an immediate hit. Featuring three slots for replacing AA batteries, the boys sold to both Soviets and Germans alike. Reenactors could navigate dark areas without having to worry about parasitic leaks and not wait for a month for shipment from Germany.

Mikey aspires to reenact at tacticals when he gets older and is learning to repair boots with a period cobbler kit. Nicholas is currently learning about resin printing, and has found himself to be quite the salesman.

Dave is proud of his sons for their dedication and willingness to learn. Their story is a testament of creative pursuit, ingenuity, a father's love, and how one act of kindness can go a long way to impact lives forever.

"An aspect of being part of the WWII HRS is knowing we are a large, living community. We have many members of different factions, and each unit is unique in its own way. All units are little families with their own dynamics, their own cultures, and their own goals. Why not celebrate it?" said Wurth in an interview at D-Day Connegut.

Wurth noted that there is a close relationship between preservation and units, remarking how most reenactors started because of childhood visits.

"If we want to live up to our motto, to preserve excellency, we should encourage current and new community members to be their best and find ways to improve."

Wurth is a proud member of the WWII HRS' Greywolves Company Living History Group. Speaking German, French, Ukrainian, and Russian, she is heavily involved in Eastern Front affairs, interviewing veterans with her own Soviet group, also part of the WWII HRS – The OSOAVIAKHIM Foundation.

The Invasion of France

Travelling back in time to experience village life in WWII

Located in Chaplin Creek Village, Franklin Grove, IL, the WWII HRS' 5th Großdeutschland Division hosted a groundbreaking new type of immersion tactical. With the setting of Chagny, a small town nestled into the Ardennes, the event keyed in on tasteful integration of civilians into the tactical scenario.

"We as reenactors often talk about how cool something like that would be, but I've never seen it happen quite like this," said Parker Hancock. The event included a few scripted moments and interactive points that played a role in keeping the momentum of the event. The village included a bank, which took real world currency in exchange for usable, period-looking event currency, a general store, a cafe, and a black market, which enabled attendees to purchase items and food.

for the ability to rely on their unarmed populace for intelligence and resources.

When the two armies clashed, armor proved to be pivotal in engagements. The integrated force style of combat made for many blood-pumping scenarios.

"There was one moment where myself, Don Jordan, and his PAK crew were fending off a counter attack from the north. Out of the corner of my eye, I saw British armor rolling up on our far right. Our PAK, of course, was facing the wrong direction! I pointed out the enemy armor, Don started shouting, and they rotate the gun at the same time the gun of the armor was turning toward us. We planted the gun and fired first. Good Lord, that was intense."

"The Last Urrah"

A Solemn Remembrance

May 2025 marks the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Berlin and the end of World War II in Europe—an event that forever changed the world and continues to resonate in society and among those who work to preserve history.

In April 1945, the Red Army advanced into the heart of the Third Reich, culminating in a brutal, final offensive that determined Europe's fate. The Battle for Berlin was one of the most intense urban battles of the war, claiming tens of thousands of lives on both sides. By May 2nd, the swastika had demolished and the Soviet banner had risen above the Reichstag. Days later, on May 8, Germany surrendered Nazi unconditionally. The guns finally fell silent.

Now, eight decades later, the 80th anniversary offers a moment of reflection—not only on the staggering sacrifices made, but also on how those sacrifices shaped the modern world. The peace that followed came at an enormous cost, with entire cities reduced to rubble and millions of soldiers and civilians killed.

The importance of reenactors and living historians has never been greater. What was once thought of as a mere hobby is now understood to be an effective educational and empathetic tool. In a way that textbooks can- sober, respectful, and knowledgeable reenactments can shed light on the intricacies of battles, the human spirit's tenacity, and the tremendous cost of war.

This anniversary occurs at a time when the last living witnesses to WWII are rapidly disappearing. The twinkle in their eyes are a glimmer left from their youthful selves. Their stories, once told first hand, are now entrusted to books, films, museums, and historians. As global conflicts reshape borders and challenge international order, WWII serves as a reminder rather than simply historical reference points.

Today, the risk is not only forgetting, but also misremembering the war.



National Battle: JS mentioned that next year is the 50th anniversary year for the HRS and JS suggested the National Battle be coordinated with that. DC agreed that made sense and strongly suggested that funds be set aside for the National Battle. DC further suggested that the HRS breakfast funding at Rockford be eliminated to move those funds over to the National Battle. DC made a motion that \$3,000.00 be set aside for transportation and \$1,000.00 be set aside for meals at the battle. RK seconded the motion. A BOD vote was taken and passed.

The Edge – AB reported that Lindsey Hancock is not available to assist, however, Leah advised that she has five (5) people and will be happy to assist as The Edge editor. JS mentioned a few guidelines, such as 6 times a year would be good, photographers would be useful and happy to assist with pictures. JS asked that Leah send some samples of what "their" vision would be. Rich Russo suggested that it contain a calendar of upcoming events. Leah proposed that there be an addition added to The Edge in which articles about museums that appeal to reenactors be added to the Edge editions. All agreed that was a great idea.

Reimbursement of Battle of Seelow Heights event expenses of \$500.00. The documentation was received and reviewed. RK made a motion to pay \$500.00, which was seconded by DC. A BOD vote was taken and passed. Once the bank issues are worked out, WM will send out the payment.

New Business:

Safety & Authenticity Committee – Safety Booklet. DC started drafting a Safety Booklet for events as an alternative to S&A inspections for events. It would be used for events, crew served weapons, vehicles, etc. DC had a lengthy discussion about the mechanics and will submit a written proposal to the BOD prior to the May board meeting.





Fall of France - Event Funding Request and insurance request. Rich Russo has 80 guys registered at \$35.00 each and is requesting \$750.00 (\$500.00 for site rental and \$250.00 for food) for the event. RR discussed the event and other issues such as transportation costs, etc. JS mentioned that the HRS already paid \$160.00 for the additional insurance. AB suggested that the HRS fund \$300.00, DC suggested \$140.00. DC made a motion to fund an additional \$140.00, seconded by RK. A BOD vote was taken and passed.

HRS Event – Marengo WW2 Days Austin Collins, the 29th, with no funding request. RK made a motion to approve, WM seconded. A BOD vote was taken and passed.

JS brought up an issue of units with smaller numbers asking for the HRS to approve their events. DC suggested that the BOD look into a future issue that units who want to get events approved must meet the minimum number of unit members.

HRS Event - Tonganoxie VFW Military Vehicle Show & D-Day Encampment. RK made a motion to approve, DC and WM seconded. A BOD vote was taken and passed. The event will be a sponsor HRS event.

Secretary of State Invoice. RK made a motion, seconded by DC that the KSN Invoice for \$14.00 be paid. A BOD vote was taken and passed. A check will be sent.

New Event Request - June 2025 tactical: Stalemate: Kuban 1943. A discussion about the self-funded event was given by Parker Hancock, which is 5th Companie, Panzergrenadier, Lehr. The sponsoring unit is 50th Rifles. DC made a motion to approve the event as an HRS sponsored event, seconded by RK. A BOD vote was taken and approved. The event will be accepted as an HRS sponsored event.

Open Comments:

DC suggested we continue the "day membership" discussion. JS suggested we not call it a membership so there is no confusion whether they are or are not "members". DC gave a short history of the prior reciprocal insurance issue with other organizations such as LHRA.

WM had a comment about the base rate of \$20.00 per member and possibly eliminating the early-bird discounts.

RK needs to send out the UC commander lists.

Leah asked about the use of Zeffy if an organization does not have an EIN. JS suggested he'd look into it and would speak directly with Leah. RK mentioned that the HRS possibly look into using Zeffy to assist units collect event charges and pay those back to the unit itself as event funding.





Announcements: The next meeting will be targeted for May 17, 2025.

<u>Adjourn:</u> RK made a motion to adjourn, seconded by DC. A BOD vote was taken and meeting adjourned at 8:51pm.

TIPS & TRICKS

"Perform regular maintenance on your footwear after every outing. Mold and dry rot are constant enemies." - German

"Keep clothing out of areas where moths may be present... as much as they smell, mothballs will work wonders." - German



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
